### Appendix 2: Terms of Reference (ToR) for the Technical Working Group (TWG) for HCV MYNI for Management and Monitoring

#### 1. Overview

#### Background

The first Malaysian HCV Toolkit document namely the Malaysian National Interpretation (MYNI) of the High Conservation Value Resource Network (HCVRN)'s Common Guidance for the Identification of HCVs<sup>1</sup> was developed through a multi-stakeholder process that was facilitated by Proforest with oversight from a Steering Committee (SC) and with funding from WWF-Malaysia. It was completed and launched in November 2018 after a lengthy process of public consultations including regional workshops in Sabah, Sarawak and Peninsular Malaysia, and a national workshop in Kuala Lumpur.

While the first guidance document is not commodity-specific, there is a need for an MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs which is commodity- or sector-specific. This is because the management and monitoring approaches are not exactly the same across different commodity production, although there are some commonalities.

WWF-Malaysia and RSPO, have jointly agreed to provide funding for the development of an MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs specific to the palm oil and forestry sectors with Proforest appointed as the facilitator and secretariat for the process

Production of MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs shall involve a multi-stakeholder consultation process, and the toolkit should be jointly owned by the stakeholders involved in the development process rather than by any individual party.

#### **1.1 Scope and Deliverables**

The TWG is a group of subject matter specialists to provide advice and technical inputs for the development of MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs. It will comprise the stakeholders that are involved in the assessment, management and monitoring of the HCV areas in the country. The TWG is structured in accordance with the three geographical regions in Malaysia namely Sabah, Sarawak and Peninsular Malaysia as these three regions vary substantially in legal frameworks, pace of economic development and the extent of environmental degradation.

The deliverable will consist of the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs document developed in accordance with the updated HCV generic definitions and relevant guidance documents by the HCV Resource Network (HCVRN). Specifically, it will include:

- i. National guidance for the management and monitoring of HCVs relevant to palm oil and forestry production in Malaysia
- ii. Indicators and specific guidance, and
- iii. Accompanying checklist and references

#### **1.2 Meaning of these Terms of Reference**

These Terms of Reference outline the common intention and aspirations of the subscribing organisations working together to ensure the completion of the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs. Although these Terms of Reference are not legally-binding, they represent the values, approaches and goals that are supported in good faith by these organisations. As far as possible,

these Terms of Reference propose processes that are open, consultative and collaborative and that also aim to produce effective and demonstrable outcomes.

#### 2. Governance

The members of TWG are appointed by the HCV Malaysia Toolkit Steering Committee (SC) specifically to produce the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs. As such, the TWG shall report directly to the SC. The TWG will automatically cease to exist once the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs is published.

#### 3. Roles and Responsibilities

Key roles and responsibilities of the TWG are:

- To provide technical inputs for the development of the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs;
- To draft the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs, in close collaboration with the facilitator and secretariat, for approval by the SC;

#### 3.1 Membership Composition

Membership of the TWG is voluntary, and it will comprise (but not limited to) the organisations listed in Annex A that have agreed to become members of the TWG. Priorities will be given to organisations/ individuals with the relevant skills, experiences and qualities as follows:

- Prior experience in the HCV approach, especially in the management and monitoring of HCVs
- Representation from different stakeholder sectors and geographic regions in Malaysia
- Subject matter expertise e.g. biodiversity conservation, social assessment etc.
- Strong commitment to the multi-stakeholder process

#### **3.2 Facilitator and Secretariat**

The Secretariat and Facilitator for the TWG shall be the same as that appointed by the Steering Committees (i.e. Proforest) and shall be responsible for scheduling TWG meetings for the TWG, preparing and circulating the meeting agenda in advance, preparing meeting notes, circulating the meeting notes in a timely manner before the subsequent meeting, and preparing relevant documentation related to the drafting of the toolkit.

#### **3.3 Decision-making process**

In line with the open, consultative and collaborative process, as far as possible decisions of the TWG will be by consensus, that is, decisions are accepted in the absence of sustained objection. In the case where a consensus cannot be reached after a reasonable time has passed, a decision may be made by a simple majority vote by the TWG members. Where a vote is taken, the range of perspectives shall be reflected in the meeting notes as part of the record of the deliberations.

Except as otherwise herein stated, the TWG shall determine its own ways of working, including preparation of its agenda, establishment of sub-groups for specific HCV principles and criteria, and keeping of records and other documents and report on its activities and progress.

#### **3.4 Participation in TWG meetings**

Each member organisation of the TWG shall be an equal and active member. The member agency shall designate one principal representative and an alternate as its representative at the TWG meetings. Both representatives can attend the TWG meetings but each member organisation only has one vote. To ensure an efficient process, partner organisations shall make all efforts to ensure continuity of attendance at meetings by the same representative(s).

Member organisations, when unable to attend a TWG meeting, may make their views known to the Secretariat via e-mail.

The quorum for conducting the TWG meeting shall be no less than half of the membership of the TWG.

#### 3.6 Withdrawal from the TWG

Any member organisation may withdraw from the TWG by giving notice in writing to the Secretariat. Any member organisation failing to attend three consecutive TWG meetings without informing the Secretariat may be deemed to have withdrawn unless they communicate in writing their desire to continue as the TWG.

#### **3.7 Time Commitment by TWG members**

The tenure of the TWG is dependent on the timeline for the development of the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs, which is expected to take place between January 2020 and June 2021. It is expected that the TWG will physically meet two or three times within this period until the toolkit is completed and published. The Secretariat will organise meeting agendas and notes, meeting times, and venues. Each physical meeting is expected to take about half-a-day. In between physical meetings, TWG members are expected to provide technical inputs via email and other means, review technical documents, provide recommendations, contribute case studies etc. as and when appropriate. If there is a need to extend the timeline for the completion of the MYNI for the Management and Monitoring of HCVs, the Secretariat will advise accordingly based on the advice from the SC.

#### 3.8 Copyright and Ownership

The new toolkit shall be jointly owned by all the stakeholders involved in the development process.
